

© Coming to the Table—Ushers will invite worshipers to the Lord's Table by rows. 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[†] In the ancient world, various peoples lit fires to mark the turning of the light into winter's season and to pray for the return of the light. The church has Christianized that practice in the lighting of the Advent wreath. To us, these candles are signs of the growing light of Christ who is coming again in all fullness into the darkness of our world. Until the dawning of that great day, we watch and wait in the Holy Spirit for Christ's coming into the darkness of our world, lighting candles of hope, peace, joy, and love, and remembering the promises of God with prayer.

The Eucharistic Prayer is based on the O Antiphons, which used Old Testament images as descriptors of Christ and were sung from December 17 through 23 before and after the chanting of the Magnificat. The first letters of the key Latin words—Sapientia (Wisdom), Adonai (Lord), Radix Jesse (Root of Jesse), Clavis David (Key of David), Oriens (Sunrise), Rex Gentium (King of Nations), and Emmanuel (God with us)—when read backward, spell "Ero cras," "I will be tomorrow," that is, on December 24. The centuries-old hymn "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel" has made the O Antiphons ecumenically popular. You are encouraged to use the blessing at the conclusion of the Eucharistic Prayer ("Come, Lord Jesus, be our guest,") as a prayer at mealtime.

LAYING ON OF HANDS & ANOINTING WITH OIL

&All who wish to come forward may do so on their own or on behalf of another unable to attend. As you come forward, sit in one of the chairs placed between the baptismal and the Lord's Table. The pastor will ask privately if there is a request for specific prayer. An elder will join in the laying on of hands and then proceed with the anointing with oil. Following the anointing, you may return to your seat. As individuals come forward for the laying on of hands and anointing with oil, the congregation will sing, Give Us Light, Glory to God 467.

A COMMENTARY ON A SERVICE FOR HEALING & WHOLENESS

A Reformed Understanding for the Service for Healing & Wholeness

All healing comes from God. Sometimes miraculous healing occurs. Generally, God works through human skill, knowledge, and training to bring about healing. Highly trained medical professionals, technology, and medicine aid in the healing process. All are direct gifts from God.

Healing was an integral part of the ministry of Jesus. Jesus healed from a distance (Luke 7:1-10), but he more typically used touch in the process of healing (Matt. 9:18; Mark 16:18; Luke 4:40). In Jesus' day many who were ill had become social outcasts. He reached out and brought healing and wholeness to those isolated in illness. As Jesus acted, so must his church. The Service for Healing & Wholeness reaches out and touches those who need healing in body, mind, or spirit.

The Service for Healing & Wholeness may include the laying on of hands and the anointing with oil. This is mystical and mysterious, but not magic. No tricks, gimmicks, or magical incantations are used to invoke the Holy Spirit. In this service, the church acknowledges the constant and abiding presence of God. The Service for Healing & Wholeness affirms that even in the midst of bodily illness, pain and suffering, our relationship with God in Christ sustains us. The service also recognizes that confession, forgiveness, and reconciliation are essential to wholeness.

The centerpiece of the Service for Healing & Wholeness is prayer. Prayer may be spoken, sung, and enacted. Enacted prayer is words combined with specific actions: laying on of hands, anointing with oil. Prayer begins with a thanksgiving for God's promise of wholeness, intercessions, and supplications. Time is granted for silent prayer. In the laying on of hands,

an outward sign of the prayer is given through touch. The touch of human hands is able to convey the grace-filled touch of Christ in a unique and tangible manner. Anointing with oil may also be included in this service as a sign of God's grace and healing mercy. The anointing of the sick has been part of pastoral ministry since New Testament times (Mark 6:13; James 5:14-15). It is to be understood in terms of its spiritual effect as an external sign of the presence of Christ, who continues his ministry of salvation and healing.

Why use oil? Oil is something tangible that engages the senses. It aids in the communication of God's loving care and compassion for the person in need of healing and wholeness. Olive oil was the medicine of the ancients, used to soften and clean wounds. Olive oil was used to anoint prophets and kings, thereby signifying the blessing and call-

ing of God. Jesus is referred to as the anointed Messiah.

The specific oil used is traditionally the finest grade of olive oil or chrism that is available. Chrism is a mixture of olive oil and aromatic oils...Chrism is etymologically related to the name of Christ, the anointed One or Messiah. Chrismation can be a helpful sign of the individual's life in Christ.

Expectations for the Service for Wholeness

Healing is a gift not a right. When Jesus prayed in the Garden of Gethsemane he prayed, "Not what I want but what you want" (Matt. 26:39). His most faithful prayer did not take away his suffering and death, but instead provided him with strength for the journey.

Prayer spoken and enacted cannot guarantee healing in the sense of cure. Cure may not come. Cancer may not go into remission. The divorce may take place. An alienated child may not return home. Nevertheless, God is sovereign. We do not control God or God's action. By God's invitation, we pray trusting in God's mercy and grace to grant wholeness.

A relationship with Jesus Christ will be reestablished or deepened and strengthened. The service may breach the barrier between the person and Christ, that is, serve a reconciling function, and help the person to be open to Christ's healing, reconciling love. Healing is to be understood as the gift of God through the power of the Holy Spirit not as the result of the faith of the ones seeking healing nor the holiness, earnestness, or skill of those offering the prayers.

2015 ANNUAL CAMPAIGN

To date, a total of 112 giving units completed an "Estimate of Giving" card and committed a total of \$346,159.00 for the work of the church in 2015. Of those cards received, 60 members increased their giving over 2014.

Our anticipated, non-pledged income for 2015 is \$77,551.00, which brings our total anticipated income for 2015 to \$423,710.00. If nothing else changed, our expenditures for 2015 are expected to be \$459,326. This means that we currently need to cut \$35,616 from our operating budget for 2015.
