During Today's Worship

As we believe in one God, so do we believe that, from the beginning, there has been and now is and to the end of the world shall be one church... by faith in Jesus Christ.


This church is catholic, that is, universal, but it contains the elect of all ages, of all realms, of all tongues, invisible: known only to God...



Breaking of the Bread Communion of the People

© Coming to the Table—Ushers will invite worshipers to the Lord's Table by rows. All the baptized may come to the Table at the center and return by the outside aisles.

REFORMATION SUNDAY

Reformation Sunday, as we have known it, is peculiar to Protestant traditions. It is a time to recall the fact that the Church of Jesus Christ must ever and always be about the business of renewal. It's a time to recall the fact that the gospel of Jesus Christ is, and of necessity must be, highly adaptive. It is also a time to be reminded that the story of our faith must be retold in ways that are meaningful to each new generation.

The achievements of the early Reformers—those we commemorate today—are dramatic:

- the decentralization of church authority from the monolithic Roman model to more congregational and representative forms of church government;
- the articulation of the "priesthood of all believers" as opposed to the "preeminence" of clergy;
- ordination as a functional responsibility, not some indelible, elitist order;
- the elevation of preaching and teaching to a level of importance equal to that of sacramental celebration;
- the mass publication of Scripture and the recognition of the right—indeed the obligation—of
 all Christians to read and weigh the impact of it for their own lives;
- the conduct of worship in each congregation's native language, so that all have equal access to its intellectual, as well as its mystical, rewards; and,
- the dramatic increase in congregational participation in the act of worship, especially in prayer and song.

Reformation Sunday is an opportunity for us to remind ourselves that these are gifts. It is a time to remind ourselves of our need to be about the task of continual renewal as a central and ongoing concern. And it is a time to celebrate those who, with particular devotion, contributed in ways large and small to our great past of which we are the most recent beneficiaries.

[†]A Peculiar Symbol

The cover image and Opening Sentences feature the image of a rooster. During the Protestant Reformation of the 16th century, Reformed churches used the symbol of the rooster rather than the cross. The reason for this may be that most crosses at the time were crucifixes, and that clearly became the symbol of the Roman Catholic Church. Also, those were times when each side had little compassion for the other, and many Reformed Christians had been humiliated and forced to kiss a crucifix.

James Huffstutler notes that that a rooster, or a cock, is mentioned only twice in scripture. The first reference is in Proverbs 30:31, which refers to a strutting rooster as a symbol of pride. The other reference has to do with Peter's denial of knowing Jesus three times "before the cock crows" (before the morning), following Jesus' nighttime betrayal and arrest. So, of these two instances, one represents vanity and the other, denial. These are hardly positive images! Why would Reformed churches have adopted the rooster as a symbol?

Yet, we read that Jesus likens himself to a "hen gathering her brood under her wings" (Matt. 23:37). Several Latin hymns from the 4th century include the use of the rooster as one who calls believers to the approach of the new day. So, the symbol of the rooster was used by Reformed churches atop their steeples as the call to awaken to the new day of faith and the new life in Christ. In Holland, especially, and perhaps elsewhere as well, one could tell the faith of a church—or even a whole town—by the use of the rooster or the cross.

In the end, the reformers did not trust symbols, and so did not use them much. Actually, the veneration of statues and the abuse connected with jewel-encrusted reliquaries and golden altars were objects of scorn for them. So virtually all creative energy went into music, and what a rich treasury we have because of it.

The Reformed Tradition has always been careful in its use of symbols so that they may lead worshipers to a deeper understanding of faith rather than serve as a focus unto themselves. In worship, as in all else in the church, we are to reform and keep being reformed by the living God who works among us. (-James C. Huffstutler in Howard L. Rice & James C. MUSIC NOTES

Martin Luther's hymn, *A Mighty Fortress Is Our God*, was likely originally published in a book of spiritual songs from 1529; however, there is no copy of this book still in existence. A copy of the second edition of the book from 1533 does contain this text. The text, based upon Psalm 46, presents Christianized treatment of the Hebrew material, but in its day that was considered an appropriate way to understand the psalms. The hymn has been translated into more than 200 languages. (*-Glory to God, A Companion* by Carl P. Daw)
