Back to School Breakfast

A WORD FROM OUR PASTOR...



On the day after white supremacists marched on Charlottesville, Virginia, which resulted in the death of Heather Heyer, I preached a sermon, still partly numb that such a thing could happen. In America. In 2017. Recent years have included several incidents that have touched

the raw nerve of race in America.

It was just three years ago that Michael Brown was killed in Ferguson, and yet, it has already been three years. The city of Ferguson and the greater St. Louis area received national attention for months following that day. The Fargesn Media Project is a series of seven videos, developed in seven episodes, "each telling an untold story of the people and places that surround the history of Ferguson." "Fargesn" is a Yiddish word meaning "forgotten." It is an informative and compelling series and you can find all seven videos here, http://www.fargesn.com/.

In one particular video, I remember watching two African American young women relate their frustration at how white Americans continue to be bewildered by why African Americans are so frustrated with the difficulty of race in America. With despair on her face and hopelessness in her voice, one of the young women said something like, "I'm just so tired of white people asking black people why we're so angry. I'm not going to keep explaining it. I'm tired of explaining it over and over to you. Don't ask me anymore. I'm done. You're just going to have to figure it out yourself."

That struck me, because it caused me to realize my desire to pretend like there's not really a problem or, if there is, then it's someone else' problem. This young woman's line in the sand put the onus back where it belongs, which is on me to engage the struggle. No longer could I complain about it, whine about it, point fingers, or merely wish things were different. This young woman's words drew me into being a part of the solution, which I have wanted to avoid because the solution

seems so elusive and difficult and messy and hard. And it might make me confront something about myself I would rather not know.

In the wake of the events in Charlottesville, I learned that white supremacy is a social movement with a political agenda and white supremacists do not merely bring their bigotry to whatever town they come to. No, by coming they empower and embolden the bigotry that already exists there. And more and more, they aren't worried about anonymity.

On that Sunday following the march in Charlottesville, I quoted William Faulkner who wrote, "The past isn't dead. It isn't even past." I said it then and I say it again and I will keep saying it: the Gospel of Jesus Christ condemns such hatred and bigotry and fear-mongering and violence. There is no gospel in it and courageous moral leadership demands that we not only believe that, but act in ways that reveal we believe it.

May we all stand up, speak out and work against all that seeks to tear us apart. No one is going to do it for us. If it's going to be done, we will have to do it. The Gospel demands nothing less. May it be so and may it be so.

Music Notes

Did you know that participating in a musical ensemble has been shown to be beneficial for the body, mind, and spirit? We invite anyone who likes to sing to join the choir. Choir meets on Wednesday evenings at 7:15. No experience is necessary and you do not need to read music to join the choir. We welcome all who love music and love singing.

Last spring New Hope hosted a hymn festival. At this event we began to learn about the history of hymns. Some of the earliest Christian hymns come from the Greeks of the 3rd century.

Many of the words used by musicians today come from the Greek language. They include the word music itself, which meant "the art of the muses." The muses were goddesses, each representing a different art. Examples of music-related words coming from the Greek include symphony, orchestra, harmony, and chorus.

Consider the words of this familiar hymn. "This is my Father's world, and to my listening ears, all nature sings, and round me rings the music of the spheres."

The term "music of the spheres" was coined by a man named Pythagoras, who was born about 570 years before Christ. You will probably remember him from your studies of mathematics. What you may not know is that Pythagoras was the founder of a school. His followers devoted themselves to the study of philosophy, mathematics, astronomy, and music while observing a rather strict moral code. Pythagoras discovered the principles which form the foundation of harmony in western music.

He also concluded that "music was the ordering principle of the world." Why did he have this opinion? See next month's Music Notes to learn more.




Adult Education Opportunities




Female Connection

-Collect Readin' and Writin' kits and Student Dental kits by October 8. Lists of items for each kit are in the information area.


On Saturday, October 14 starting at 9:30 a.m.
