A Place of Grace: Junk Journaling Julie Gvillo, Place of Grace

Junk Journaling is a creationfriendly method of using what would normally be tossed in the trash to create new things. It not only practices good stewardship of creation; it also practices good stewardship of resources.

Gather six, same-sized, used envelopes. Cut off the flaps and trim the open tops to the same height. Fold them each firmly in the center. Stack and staple them in the center fold to create a book. Use wrapping paper scraps to decorate the "pages." Insert index cards (cut to fit) into the pockets. Use these cards to journal about your Advent preparations physical, mental, and emotional - and tuck them into the pockets created by the open tops of the envelopes. Embellish as desired. 2. Gather your Christmas cards. Write notes on the backs of each to

celebrate your relationship(s) to the sender(s). If photos or letters were included, create pockets for them along the bottom of the back of the card with a strip of paper glued on three sides. Create a template with three holes down a strip of cardstock that will fit inside the crease of each card. Poke holes in each card using your template. Stitch your cards together back to front with a needle and string, ribbon, or embroidery thread through holes in the crease of each card: in through the center, out through the top, in through the bottom, back out through the center, then to the next card until the end. Slide a length of the string or ribbon under the rest and tie a bow. Tie beads on the ends at each end to keep the strings from coming out. This is your Christmas celebration journal. Call each of the card senders during the 12 days of Christmas to thank them for their and have card a conversation with them.

Epiphany 3. your Make wonders book out of leftover gift boxes. Cut flat pieces to the same size and paint them black. Use a hole punch to punch the corners and bind them together with an "O" ring. Cut a paper snowflake every day from used paper. Attach the snowflake to the page with Mod Podge or Elmer's Glue and then sprinkle with glitter. Journal about the wonders you encounter in scripture or in life in the surrounding background with a white gel pen.

4. On Ash Wednesday, lunch-sized assemble two brown bags to make a Lenten reflection journal. Cut and glue from newspapers, magazines, or printed web matter/phone photos to create collages that illustrate the things you are grappling with during this Lenten season. Folded in half, the open ends create natural "pockets" for journaling cards that can be tucked.

One item you will see on the PW in the Congregation Remittance Form is Synod Assessment (15 cents for each Presbyterian Woman in our

Presbytery). This is an annual obligation we have to the Presbyterian Women in the Synod of Mid-America. In 2023, our assessment was

\$781.27 based on Giddings Lovejoy Presbytery's membership of 10,417 members. There is no consideration of how many of the churches in our Presbytery actually have active Presbyterian Women groups. And, many of the churches that do have PW groups are unaware of this obligation. If your church wanted to contribute their

"fair share", that amount would total \$.15 times 1/2 the membership of your congregation. As of 11/17/23, has been received towards this expense from 4 churches which means they have contributed more than their "fair share"! Funds from the line item Presbyterian Women of Giddings-Lovejoy Operating Expenses on the PW in the Congregation Remittance Form are used to the 3 gap, additional churches have

donated to this account which totals \$423. However, there is still a shortfall of \$175.27 for this obligation. Fortunately, there are sufficient funds in our checking account to cover the deficit. However, we are asking each church to please consider doing your part to help us fulfill our Synod Assessment each year!!! Use the PW in the Congregation Remittance Form included in this issue of the Linkletter to send in your contribution. Thank you!



NOTE: Please only bring guns to be surrendered. All guns should be unloaded and in the trunk of the vehicle. Guns will be dismantled on site while you wait.

What is Guns to Gardens?

After the shooting at the Sandy Hook School in Dec. 2012, Mennonite pastor Mike Martin felt a call to become a blacksmith and forge unwanted guns into garden tools. He founded RAWtools as a network of blacksmiths across the nation. Soon he was joined by theologian Shane Claiborne and by New Mexicans to Prevent Gun Violence who christened the project "Guns to Gardens." It began to grow.

After a mass shooting in the nearby grocery store in 2021, Community United Church of Christ in Boulder, CO offered a "Gun Safe Surrender" event in their parking lot. Dozens of firearms were surrendered and turned into garden tools. The idea of churches offering this healing, spiritual, and practical service was born. In March 2022 the Denver Broncos football team hosted a Guns to Gardens event at their stadium in Mile High, CO, transforming 189 guns. That June 11, on a single day, churches and others across the USA dismantled over 1,000 guns.
