Blood Drive Update

On behalf of the deacons, I would like to thank everyone who participated in the blood drive that was held at New Hope Presbyterian Church on March 18th, 2018.

I would like to highlight some points from a letter that was sent by Amanda Hess the Director of Donor Relations with Mississippi Valley Regional Blood Center. She wanted to thank all the donors of New Hope Presbyterian Church for the blood drive that was held on March 18th, 2018. Donations rates may fluctuate depending on the season, but the demand for blood products at the hospitals they sever is constant.

Staff members in their component production are able to produce as many as four different blood components from every whole blood donation. With all of your support they were able to collect 18 units on the day of the blood drive, which will serve up to 72 patients at the local hospitals.

With our participation in events like this will help to ensure that they have blood on the shelves when patients need it. Mississippi Valley wanted to express their appreciation to all who participated for the commitment to their mission.

Music Notes

Last year at this time the Presbyterian Women sponsored a hymn festival. In this program we explored the history of hymnody from early years of the Christian church up to the present day. The articles in the New Hope Press newsletter this year have been essentially information that was presented at that hymn festival. We conclude this academic year's newsletters with information from last year's hymn festival about the "father of English hymnody," Isaac Watts (1674-1748). Watts was a "dissenter" - a non-Church of England Protestant.

Millar Patrick, in his book The Story of the Church's Song, states that at the end of the 17th century metrical psalmody was "deplorable in the extreme." Isaac Watts observed that in worship services that among the congregation there was dull indifference and a careless air towards the singing of the psalms. One Sunday he returned from the service, complaining to his father about the psalm-singing that put people off worship. His father replied, "Why don't you write a hymn suitable for congregational singing?" In the course of the afternoon Watts did so. Some of his most beloved hymns include When I Survey the Wondrous Cross, Joy to the World, O God Our Help in Ages Past, Jesus Shall Reign Where'er the Sun, and Alas, And Did My Savior Bleed.

His hymns became popular because of their ability of give voice to the religious thoughts and emotions of the average believer. Hymn texts allow for more freedom of theological expression than simply paraphrases of Biblical texts. Therefore the singing of hymns (as opposed to metrical psalmody) caused splits within the church. Some complained these hymns were "too worldly." But Watt's legacy has endured. Who are some of the other important writers of hymn texts? Look for the answer in an upcoming issue of the newsletter.


Experience the Ride of a Lifetime with God!
