We can see them gathering the eggs, candle them, feed the livestock, etc. We will learn about pasture fed livestock and livestock fed in confined spaces, how the manure feeds the fields and how much happier the livestock are if they're free to roam instead of being in confined spaces.

We will leave New Hope parking lot at 8:30 am to arrive in Cuba by 10:00 am. The tour will last about 2 hours. Our hosts have offered to serve lunch! After lunch there should be time to visit the historic murals in town and the world's largest rocking chair.

Music Notes


"How Can I Keep from Singing?"

Daniel Levitin, psychology professor at McGill University and author of This is Your Brain on Music, analyzed the changes in people's brain activity when they sing together. Levitin concluded that feelings of belonging and elevation of mood are biologically ingrained to surface with communal singing. Neurological research suggests that our brains release oxytocin when we sing with others. Oxytocin is a chemical involved in social bonding. Research also suggests that when singing music we enjoy with other people, ours brains release more of two powerful neurotransmitters called serotonin and dopamine. Dopamine activates the brain's pleasure center, while serotonin is commonly deployed to ward off depression.

A PhD student said, "All those moments of singing together with other people created in me a feeling of peace, a feeling of unity, a feeling of belonging, and connection that otherwise in the world is challenging."

"I can go into a rehearsal feeling gross, or having like a really bad mental health day, and I will leave there feeling uplifted, and elated, and grounded, and comforted," said a singer in the Kokopelli Choir Association.

Levitin notes that in ancient societies singing was an important part of community life. After the advent of the European concert hall, many people became spectators of professional singers, rather than active singers themselves ("American Idol," for example). It's unfortunate that many people were told as children that they don't sing well and therefore they don't want to sing. Some adults have judged themselves to be poor singers. But I submit to you that singing in a choir or in the congregation has many benefits. If you try it with an open mind and heart, you may find that you enjoy it more than you thought you would. You may



even concur with the poet of the hymn "How Can I Keep from Singing?" The refrain states in part, "Since Christ is Lord of heaven and earth, how can I keep from singing?"
