Childcare will be available for children through Pre-K.

The cost for dinner is \$5.00 per person, max. \$12.00 per family, and is paid each week. Earth Care

In June, the PCUSA and Presbyterian Mission issued the Climate Care Challenge.

"As people of faith, we believe that God created this world, called it good and told humans to care for it. We are blessed to have this sacred task."

It challenges participants to make personal steps to help decrease their personal impact on the earth. Here are some of their ideas in bold, followed by ideas of how to carry out the task.

1) Walk/bicycle, take public transportation, carpool, drive more efficiently, and avoid air travel.

We live in a suburb with inefficient public transportation and carpooling is not always feasible. We can, however, drive more efficiently. Increase your speed slowly and anticipate the traffic and slow down before applying the brakes. See if your car has a moment-by-moment miles per gallon readout. Try it for a day to learn how driving habits can affect your gas mileage.

2) Eat a (more) plant-based diet or grow your own food.

Changing your habits to include just one night a week of meat-free eating will reduce your impact on the earth. Livestock and meat production produces more greenhouse gas, requires a lot more water and uses more fossil fuels than growing vegetables and grains. Make a simple meal with grilled locally grown vegetables tossed in pasta and sauce.

3) Plant a tree or help restore a wetland.

Also don't over-water your lawn. Keep the grass slightly longer in the heat of the summer to shade the roots. Create landscapes with drought resistant plants or create rock gardens with native plants or succulents.

4) Reduce your energy use: replace your light bulbs with LEDs, add insulation, air dry clothes or do an energy audit.

Wash your clothes in cold water. Today's detergents no longer need warm water to fully clean.

5) Reduce waste: recycle, compost, and buy less.

Yes, recycle whatever you can, but also shop smart for your food and pledge to eat leftovers. Americans throw away about 150,000 tons of food each day, which is about a third of the daily calories that we consume. Surprisingly, fruits and vegetables were the most likely to be thrown out (because of their short shelf life) followed by dairy and meat.

- 6) Purchase renewable energy or carbon offsets.
- 7) Talk about why you care about climate change to your friends and family.

Share one or two of these ideas with your close friends or family.

Children and Youth Sunday School

It's almost that time again, and the staff and volunteers at New Hope are excited about starting another Sunday school year!

We're also excited about a new curriculum that we'll be using in the children and youth classrooms! The DWELL Sunday school curriculum actively engages kids in God's story using interactive games, reflective wondering, dramatic storytelling, and a whole lot of fun. This curriculum will be used in the Nursery through the Youth Sunday school classes. DWELL is grounded in a Reformed perspective. With DWELL, colorful story symbols create visual timelines; songs with kid appeal help memory verses stick; and wonderfully illustrated take-home pieces provide support to families. A carefully-crafted scope and sequence covers the entire arc of God's story - creation, fall, redemption, and restoration - at each level. Each year explores both Old and New Testaments in deepening ways as kids grow. Through it all, DWELL invites kids to find their place in God's story, living into and out of it for the rest of their lives.

As the DWELL curriculum is a sequence based curriculum, each week will build on the previous week and each year will build on the previous year. With the start of this new curriculum, we'd like to invite you to start a fresh approach to your children's Sunday school class. With regular Sunday school attendance, children not only learn about God (and that's the best reason to come!), they also make friends, find mentors in teachers, form good habits, and have fun!

When your children attend Sunday school on a regular basis:

- they will find the age-appropriate Bible teaching their young minds are so eager to absorb.
- we all know that parenting can be tough, but when you have Sunday school teachers working to mentor your children, they can provide another source of guidance.
- if you want your children to make more friends, Sunday school is a great place to find them. As they learn and play together on Sunday mornings, they will be able to form healthy friendships with children whose parents have the same priorities as you.
- if you start consistently taking your kiddos to church when they're young, they will forever learn the good habits of church attendance. For the rest of their lives, they'll benefit from the knowledge they gained in Sunday school.
- finally, don't forget the importance of play and fun. With our talented teachers, great activities, and friends they enjoy, your little ones will love going to Sunday school every week. This is a great way to show your kids learning about God can be really cool.

Talk To Me

Talk to Me—New Hope Embarks on a Series of Listening Sessions

"In the beginning...." Of course you all recognize the first verse of Genesis, and John begins his Gospel, "In the beginning was the Word." "The Word"—not God, not Jesus, but the Word. And every week before the Scriptures are read we are exhorted to "Hear the Word of God...." Clearly, words are important, and they give us stories. Between Genesis and John, there are hundreds of stories: Abraham and Sarah; Moses parting the Red Sea; Naomi and Ruth; David and Goliath; Mary and Joseph traveling to Bethlehem. Jesus used stories as one of his main teaching tools: the Prodigal Son; the lost sheep; the Good Samaritan. But the stories didn't stop with Christ's crucifixion and resurrection, not even with his ascension into heaven. The disciples in that upper room overcome by a great wind and flames of fire began speaking in languages of every listener, spreading the Good News throughout the world. Paul and others began writing letters. But it would be shortchanging our creative God to think the stories stopped once the scriptural canon was declared. Recently, in a sermon on the Lord's Prayer, the Rev. Dr. Christopher James quoted David Adams, who has written:

The very fact that the Prayer developed over time means that the members of the faith community gradually mingled their voices with the voice of the One they worshiped, his words becoming their words and their words becoming his. With the growth of the tradition of the Prayer and our praying of the Prayer, we witness something striking: people living into Christ, bonding with him, identifying with his deeds and words so completely that who he is and who they are begin to merge. They speak with him and through him.

Your story has brought you here—maybe carried by your mother or after wandering through your own desert for a number of years—but you are here, and we want to know about it. During the month of October, our congregation will be conducting listening sessions, not to ask you to be on a committee or increase your pledge, but simply to listen to your story. What brought you here? What are your interests and passions? Where do you see God moving in your life or how are you struggling? We hope to interview about half of our members and friends, so about 120 people. We plan to do this basically by asking the every other person on our church's rolls, however, if you would like to volunteer to be interviewed and share your story, we would be happy to oblige. Just let me know. Some of you will be asked to be listeners, others asked to share your story. Whatever your role, we hope you will say yes and enjoy this time of holy conversation, one to one. "Talk to Me."
